As the hectic activity of the holiday season approaches, their care and gate-keeping role becomes even more critical.

I especially appreciated your goodwill in September when we, regrettably, announced that the existing mecwacare Simon Price Centre in Mont Albert would close earlier than expected. This was to make way for a new \$40 million 100-bed luxurious home.

This decision was due to COVID-19 creating materials shortages in the building industry. Our construction partner had to amend the project schedule, which brought forward demolition of the old building.

We have relocated residents and staff to other mecwacare sites and services until the beautiful new home opens in 2023. I would like to thank residents. their families and our staff for their understanding and cooperation, which made this difficult job very manageable.

Closing the Simon Price Centre wasn't the only recent reluctant farewell. At our Annual General Meeting in October, Board Chair John Hood formally announced that he would be retiring after 22 years on the Board. John joined us in 1998 and has served as Chair since 2009. While he was at the helm, mecwacare thrived. We wish John well in retirement.

While this has been another year that has taken a lot of energy and patience, it's important that our Christmas appeal gets the attention it deserves, too.

This year we are highlighting the growing concern of elder abuse.

## A Miller's tale of memories

If you asked Janice, Mary and Anne who brought them together, these legends of mecwacare nursing would answer: Olive and Noel.

That's Olive Miller, the namesake of mecwacare's second nursing home built on land next to MECWA House in Warner Street, Malvern, It opened in 1991 and closed in 2003, making way for "Noel" – the much larger Noel Miller Centre – honouring Olive's husband.

This little trip down memory lane was jogged by a recent presentation of staff service awards, which spotlighted career parallels between three long-serving nursing stalwarts.

Janice Donohue, Mary Aguilar and Anne Bouchier have made their mark over many years of outstanding and loyal service, first at the Olive Miller Nursing Home and now at Noel Miller Centre in Glen Iris.

Janice and Mary were recently honoured with 30-year service awards and Anne was close behind, with 25 vears' service.

Their longevity and professionalism tell a story of dedication to their chosen careers and to mecwacare. In an industry where many members are transient, Janice, Mary and Anne represent stability.

Janice was the first to step through the doors of "Olive" in February 1991. An enrolled nurse, she is now a night duty specialist at Noel Miller Centre, working as night supervisor.

After 30 years, she is a font of knowledge and is renowned for being able to settle residents if they have difficulties during the night. One of the secrets to her approach is

knowing residents' preferences and choices.

Mary started not long after Janice in August 1991 and her experience is highly valued by her colleagues. The parallels with Janice continue because Mary, a registered nurse, also works on night duty.

Mary's colleagues especially admire how thorough she is and she has a well-earned reputation for managing assessments and documentation, with an exceptional eye for detail.

An enrolled nurse, Anne works afternoon and night shifts and as a supervisor. Residents and staff describe her as approachable and caring. Her colleagues agree that she's "gold" - loyal and pleasant and always giving her best.

#### Who we are

mecwacare is a not-for-profit, non-denominational charitable organisation that has been supporting Victorians for more than 60 years. We are a values-based, care-driven organisation that provides residential, community and in-home nursing, care and support services for the elderly and people living with a disability.

mecwacare was founded by a small group of volunteers concerned about the elderly and vulnerable in their local area and formally became the Malvern Elderly Citizens Welfare Association (MECWA) in 1959. In 2007, MECWA changed its name to mecwacare to better represent the organisation's focus as it grew into a major provider of aged care and disability services across metropolitan Melbourne and regional Victoria.

### Walking a *mile* in their shoes

An adventurous streak led Chantelle Keven to an impressive career in home care services.

A nature-lover her whole life, she went to work in an indigenous community in the Gulf of Carpentaria.

"I was supposed to be working with youth in the public health space, implementing a program to promote healthier living," Chantelle says.

"However, I found that I spent more time talking with the Aboriginal elders. I was drawn towards older people, I think. The Elders had so much wisdom and so much insight into life.

"If you have a look at older people in general, you can take so much from them, which can guide your everyday life and decisions in a positive way."

As General Manager of mecwacare's Home Care Services in the North West Region, Chantelle has since accumulated a wealth of experience that she brings to her work supporting the wellbeing and independence of older people and people with disabilities.

She came to mecwacare as a Client Services Supervisor in 2013 and has taken on a variety of management roles, while undertaking a Bachelor of Social Science/Gerontology.

"In terms of working in this sector, I get a lot of satisfaction from being able to support positive outcomes for people, whether that is staff or clients," Chantelle says.

She credits her "amazing staff" with keeping her afloat on the toughest days and acknowledges that the past two years have been difficult for clients and staff alike.

"It's complex dealing with that high level of human emotion around COVID," she says.

"I have always been passionate about supporting people to achieve their life goals. To do this well you need to work collaboratively with a strong team.

"My current team is supportive and passionate and goes the extra mile to achieve positive outcomes for all. I love working with them every day."

## Finding the *light* support

Ballarat couple Tim and Vicki Collins know that when it comes to support workers, it is essential to find a good match.

A fitter and turner by trade, Tim was first matched with a mecwacare support worker in 2017 after being diagnosed with Huntington's disease three years earlier.

Tim and support worker Hayden made weekly visits to the nearby Men's Shed, which provided projects to stimulate the body and mind.

"They would make lots of things together," Vicki says. "Stools, garden ornaments, you name it, they made it."

Huntington's disease is a genetic condition that affects the part of the brain responsible for the way we think, move and feel.

To help manage his symptoms, support workers accompany Tim to physio or doctor's appointments when Vicki is busy.

He also enjoys playing chess, visiting the local pool or simply going for walks.

Tim's outings have resulted in a new interest. After attending dance/fitness classes at the nearby aquatic centre, he was surprised to find how much he enjoyed it. "If you had asked me before I would have said no, but it was the best fun I've had," Tim says.

COVID-19 has impacted Tim's outings, as he was advised to minimise community contact to protect his health. Vicki made the difficult decision to leave her job and become Tim's primary carer.

A Mornington local, Ralph joined us at Park Hill in April. It had been nearly four decades since he last picked up a brush.

Proving it is never too late to reignite an art spark, Ralph, 90, returned to painting landscapes as part of Park Hill's vibrant lifestyle program.

Lifestyle coordinator Shannon Glover says his progress is inspiring.

"In a matter of weeks his dexterity has improved and he has taken off," Shannon says.

"Ralph comes to all the art groups.

He is also painting in his bedroom
and his family drop off extra
supplies. He is developing new
relationships in the home.

I think that coming into care has given him a new lease on life and confidence with his art."

Shannon draws on her background in visual arts to set up still life painting sessions for residents.

They combine classical music and art slideshows to round out the cultural experience.

"I reassure and encourage the residents that when you are drawing nature, you can't go wrong," Shannon says.

"Some of the residents are very selfconscious because they've lost dexterity and steadiness and vision. It's all about loose, fluid strokes. I'm like, it's absolutely perfect. It makes their artwork more impressionist in style.

"We've got a resident with zero experience looking to have a go, who focuses on colour and patterns. It doesn't have to represent anything."

When he is not painting, Ralph takes a daily walk in the beautiful Park Hill gardens and enjoys a beer in the afternoon with his neighbour.

He credits honey with keeping him looking and feeling far younger than his 90 years.
